Identifying Tracks

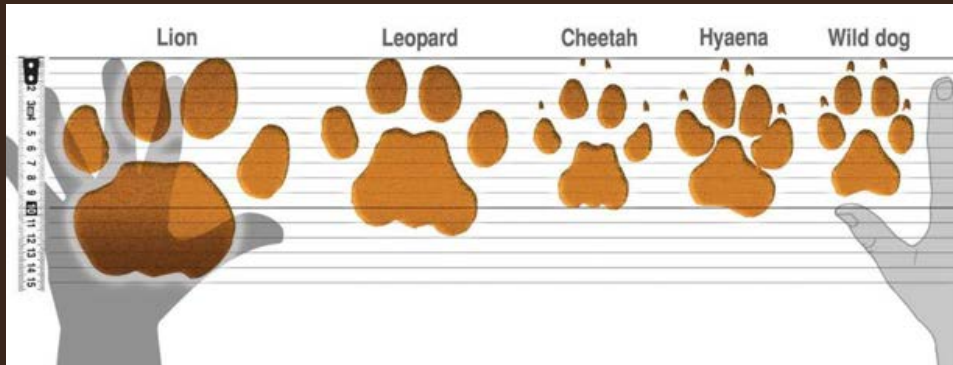


Image shared with WWDI, source unknown.

Size

Smaller than hyena, cheetah, leopard, and lion. Larger than jackal, caracal, civet, and African wild cats.

Front and back foot are similar in size.

Shape

Rectangular shape with two lobes on pad.

Toes

Four toes with nails always present.

shape in softer sand.



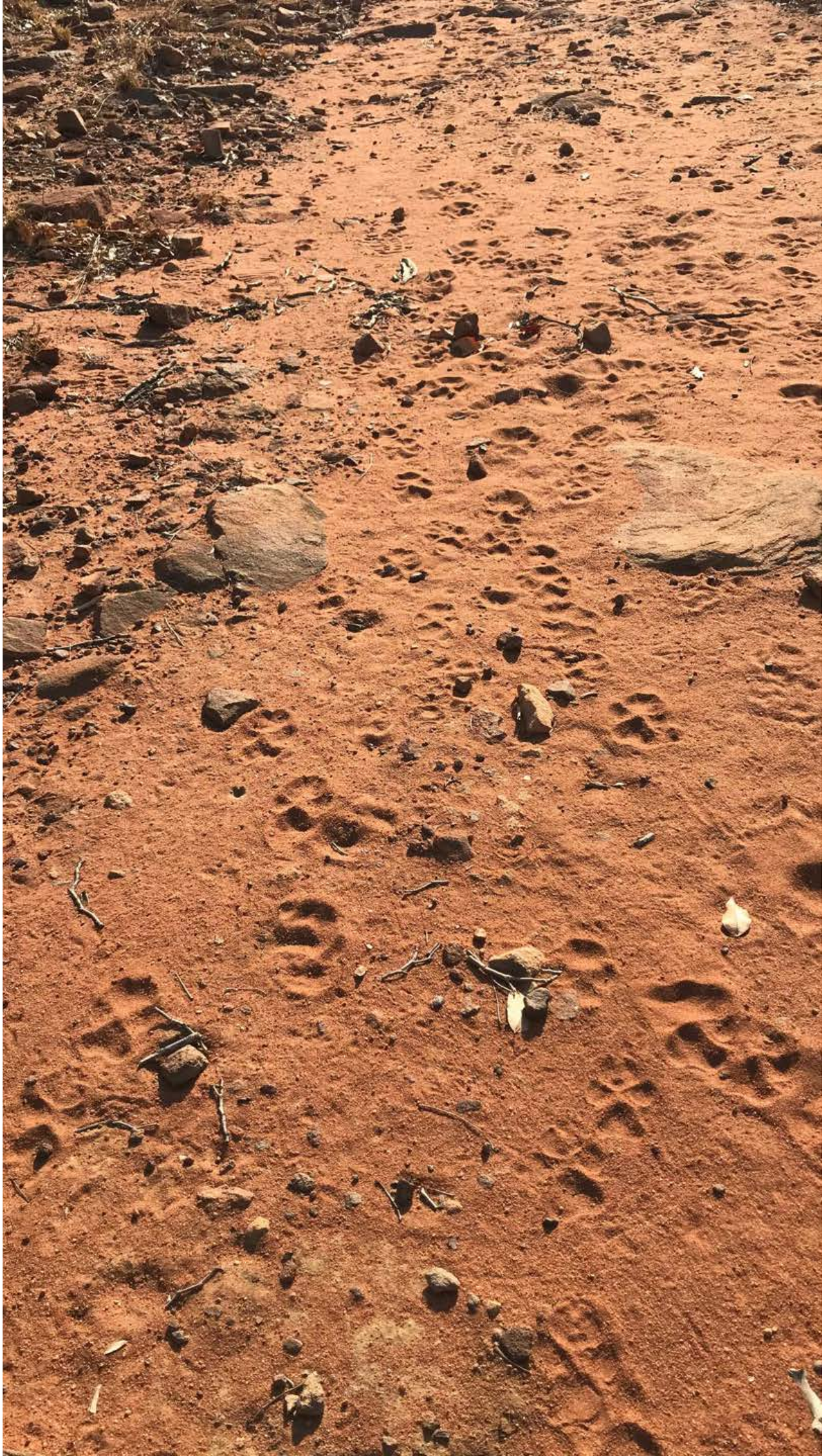

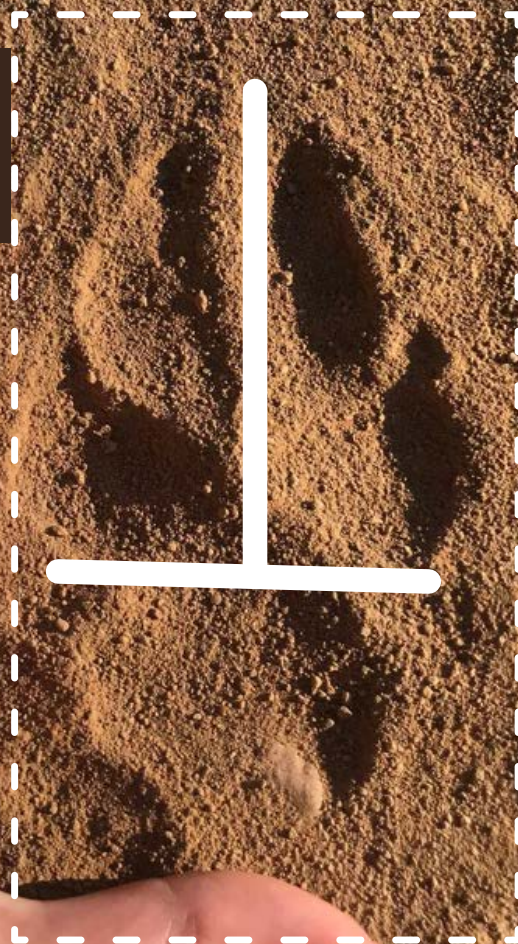

Domestic Dog

elongated shape**.
- Domestic dog tracks
vary in size and shape,
depending on the **breed**.
- Domestic dogs may
hunt **independently** or
as a pack.

Important Information



MULTIPLE SETS

Wild dogs hunt as a pack and there will be multiple sets of tracks nearby.



LOOK AT ROADS

Wild dogs often run along farm roads so tracks should be found along the roads nearby.



HUNT IN MORNING OR EVENING

Wild dogs hunt around dawn and/or dusk, when it is light but before it is too hot.



FEED QUICKLY

To avoid the carcasses being stolen by larger predators, wild dogs feed quickly and can clean a carcass in less than 10 minutes.

Monitor the Packs

WWDI is working to fit all of the wild dog packs with GPS tracking collars that allow WWDI to monitor and track their movements.

Increase Knowledge

WWDI collects accurate data on the packs to increase our understanding of these animals.

Provide Information

WWDI is a community resource, providing information about the packs' movements, diet, behaviours, conflict mitigation strategies, and answering any questions,

Raise Awareness

WWDI promotes the Waterberg Wild Dog population and their Endangered status.
